Incident Notification

Dear Sir or Madam:

We are writing on behalf of our client, Trusted Tours & Attractions, LLC ("TTA"), to notify your office of a security incident involving New Hampshire residents.¹

TTA operates the e-commerce store trustedtours.com. On July 2, 2019, TTA completed its internal investigation into the nature and extent of a security incident. TTA began its investigation on June 25, 2019, when it was alerted to potential fraudulent activity occurring on payment cards that were used on its website. After commencing its investigation, TTA discovered the presence of unauthorized code on the website. TTA immediately removed the code. TTA's investigation determined that an unauthorized person added the code so that payment card information entered by purchasers on trustedtours.com was copied and sent to an external location. The unauthorized code was present and active on the site between March 24, 2019 and June 27, 2019. For customers who placed an order on the site during one of those time periods, payment card information was at risk of being collected by the unauthorized individual. The investigation determined that the information involved includes the names, billing addresses, phone numbers, email addresses, payment card numbers, card types, card expiration dates, and card verification codes for 285 New Hampshire residents.

Beginning today, TTA will notify these 285 New Hampshire residents via United States First Class mail in accordance with N.H. Rev. Stat. § 359-C:20 in substantially the same form as the attached letter. TTA has established a dedicated call center that the impacted individuals can call with any questions regarding this incident. In addition, TTA has notified the payment card

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brands and the major, nationwide credit reporting agencies. TTA is also advising the impacted individuals to review their payment card statements and immediately report any unauthorized charges to the bank that issued their card.

To help prevent this type of incident from happening again, TTA is taking steps to further strengthen the security of its website and is in the process of moving to a check-out method with enhanced security features.

Trusted Tours & Attractions, LLC ("TTA"), which operates the e-commerce site, trustedtours.com, values the relationship we have with our customers and understands the importance of protecting your information. We are writing to inform you that we recently identified and addressed a security incident that may have involved your payment card information. This notice explains the incident, measures that have been taken, and some steps you can take in response.

On June 25, 2019, we were alerted to fraudulent activity occurring on certain payment cards that were used on our website. We commenced an investigation and discovered the presence of unauthorized code on the website. We immediately removed the code. The investigation determined that an unauthorized person added the code so that payment card information entered by purchasers on our e-commerce website was copied and sent to an external location. The code was present and active on the site between March 24, 2019 and June 27, 2019. Because you made a purchase on the website during that time frame, it is possible that your information was involved. This information includes your name, billing address, phone number, email address, payment card number ending in <<XXXXX>>>, card type, card expiration date, and the card verification code (CVV).

We encourage you to closely review your payment card statements for any unauthorized charges. You should immediately report any such charges to the bank that issued your card. If reported timely, payment card network rules generally provide that cardholders are not responsible for unauthorized charges. Information on additional steps you can take can be found on the following pages.

We regret that this incident occurred and apologize for any inconvenience. To help prevent this type of incident from happening again, we are taking additional steps to further strengthen the security of our website and are in the process of moving to a check-out method with enhanced security features. ADDITIONAL STEPS YOU CAN TAKE

We remind you it is always advisable to be vigilant for incidents of fraud or identity theft by reviewing your account statements and free credit reports for any unauthorized activity. You may obtain a copy of your credit report, free of charge, once every 12 months from each of the three nationwide credit reporting companies. To order your annual free credit report, please visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call toll free at 1-877-322-8228. If you believe you are the victim of identity theft or have reason to believe your personal information has been misused, you should immediately contact the Federal Trade Commission and/or the Attorney General's office in your state. You can obtain information from these sources about steps an individual can take to avoid identity theft as well as information about fraud alerts and security freezes. You should also contact your local law enforcement authorities and file a police report. If you are a resident of West Virginia, you have the right to ask that nationwide consumer reporting agencies place "fraud alerts" in your file to let potential creditors and others know that you may be a victim of identity theft, as described below. You also have a right to place a security freeze on your credit report, as described below.

Fraud Alerts: There are two types of fraud alerts you can place on your credit report to put your creditors on notice that you may be a victim of fraud—an initial alert and an extended alert. You may ask that an initial fraud alert be placed on your credit report if you suspect you have been, or are about to be, a victim of identity theft. An initial fraud alert stays on your credit report for at least one (1) year. You may have an extended alert placed on your credit report if you have already been a victim of identity theft with the appropriate documentary proof. An extended fraud alert stays on your credit report for seven years. You can place a fraud alert on your credit report by contacting any of the three national credit reporting agencies.

Credit Freezes: You have the right to put a credit freeze, also known as a security freeze, on your credit file, free of charge, so that no new credit can be opened in your name without the use of a PIN that is issued to you when you initiate a freeze. A security freeze is designed to prevent potential credit grantors from accessing your credit report without your consent. If you place a security freeze, potential creditors and other third parties will not be able to get access to your credit report unless you temporarily lift the freeze. Therefore, using a security freeze may delay your ability to obtain credit.

There is no fee to place or lift a security freeze. Unlike a fraud alert, you must separately place a security freeze on your credit file at each credit reporting company. To request a security freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

- 1. Your full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.)
- 2. Social Security number
- 3. Date of birth
- 4. If you have moved in the past five years, provide the addresses where you have lived over the prior five years
- 5. Proof of current address such as a current utility bill or telephone bill
- 6. A legible photocopy of a government issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, military identification, etc.)
- 7. If you are a victim of identity theft, include a copy of the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft

The credit reporting agencies have one business day after receiving your request by toll-free telephone or secure electronic means, or three business days after receiving your request by mail, to place a security freeze on your credit report. The credit bureaus must also send written confirmation to you within five business days and provide you with a unique personal identification number ("PIN") or password or both that can be used by you to authorize the removal or lifting of the security freeze.

To lift the security freeze in order to allow a specific entity or individual access to your credit report, or to lift a security freeze for a specified period of time, you must submit a request through a toll-free telephone number, a secure electronic means maintained by a credit reporting agency, or by sending a written request via regular, certified, or overnight mail to the credit reporting agencies and include proper identification (name, address, and Social Security number) and the PIN or password provided to you when you placed the security freeze as well as the identity of those entities or individuals you would like to receive your credit report or the specific period of time you want the credit report available. The credit reporting agencies have one business day after receiving your request by toll-free telephone or secure electronic means, or three business days after receiving your request by mail, to lift the security freeze for those identified entities or for the specified period of time.

To remove the security freeze, you must submit a request through a toll-free telephone number, a secure electronic means maintained by a credit reporting agency, or by sending a written request via regular, certified, or overnight mail to each of the three credit bureaus and include proper identification (name, address, and Social Security number) and the PIN number or password provided to you when you placed the security freeze. The credit bureaus have one business day after receiving your request by toll-free telephone or secure electronic means, or three business days after receiving your request by mail, to remove the security freeze.

A Summary of Your Rights Under the Fair Credit Reporting Act: The federal Fair Credit Reporting Act (FCRA) promotes the accuracy, fairness, and privacy of information in the files of consumer reporting agencies. There are many types of consumer reporting agencies, including credit bureaus and specialty agencies (such as agencies that sell information about check writing histories, medical records, and rental history records). Here is a summary of your major rights under FCRA. - You must be told if information in your file has been used against you.
- You have the right to know what is in your file.
- You have the right to ask for a credit score.
- You have the right to dispute incomplete or inaccurate information.
- Consumer reporting agencies must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information.
- Consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information.
- Access to your file is limited.
- You must give your consent for reports to be provided to employers.
- You may limit "prescreened" offers of credit and insurance you get based on information in your credit report.
- You have a right to place a "security freeze" on your credit report, which will prohibit a consumer reporting agency from releasing information in your credit report without your express authorization.
- · You may seek damages from violators.
- Identity theft victims and active duty military personnel have additional rights.
